much one person, one school, one administrator can do. The feeling that we will never be protected or we do not have time to put into place all of the pieces can be overwhelming. There are so many other priorities that seem more important - child safety, education loss due to Covid, and all of the other concerns administrators and school staff are responsible for. It is especially hard to prioritize things you don't completely understand. Then there is always the issue of lack of funding and/or lack of staff to implement the necessary items. This can all lead to making a difficult task seem nigh impossible. The key to implementing cybersecurity measures is to break it down into smaller parts. We have to look at dealing with our cybersecurity issues very similar to the way you individualize instruction for children. We don't expect a child to learn to read in one day. We know reading is a journey, and our goal on day one is to set them on that path. The good news is that Montana has some of the best Educational Technologists throughout the state. They can help you individualize the steps for your network and your environment. Here are some tools to put into your toolbelt to help you on your way:

1. Training Your Staff and Yourself - This is a key element to protecting your environment. It is required by your insurance company but can sometimes be hard to fit into your everyday tasks. The National Cyber Security Alliance (NCA) and Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Agency (CISA) work together to create a theme every year for Cybersecurity Awareness Month. They post materials for the general public to use to become more educated in cybersecurity. If you partner with them, for FREE, they will send you press releases, training videos on various topics, and social media graphics and logos to share with your community and staff. This can be the start of your training and put you on the path to reaching your cybersecurity goals.

- 2. **Sign up for MS-ISAC assistance** Many of you have been filling out your cybersecurity insurance forms and wondering how you can implement penetration testing, phishing campaigns, etc with a lack of funding. As a public education entity, you can receive assistance for FREE from MS-ISAC to implement some of the things that are now required for cybersecurity protection. Visit MS-ISAC for K-12 Schools to sign up for their free program. If you would like to request these services simply send an email tovulnerability@cisa.dhs.gov with the subject line "Requesting Cyber Hygiene Services" to get started.
- 3. **META** Of course I have to put in a shameless plug for the Montana Educational Technologists Association. Make sure you and/or your Technologist are members of META. Our members are from all over the state and we are here to help with quick answers to questions, presentations, etc. Being a member is an invaluable resource. Consider it to be the best 'graduated reader' program one could ask for. There are quite a few benefits such as a membership to Consortium for School Networking (COSN) for the Technologist, and all Administrators, access to the other Technologists throughout the state, and Cybersecurity Training for your team through a partnership with Cyber Montana and Cybrary!

The bottom line is to take Cybersecurity under your wing, much like one of your students, and assess its strengths, its opportunities for growth, and to start to individualize the instruction around that! Please let me know, or any other META member know if you need help or have questions! We are all in this together!

To this end, SAM has historically deployed a Legislative Network (LN), which includes members from all affiliates, representing all parts of our great state. We will be looking for volunteers to establish this network and I would encourage you to get involved. As a member of SAM LN your primary responsibility is to stay engaged with what is happening in the legislature and get information to the SAM colleagues in your region of the state. Our role in the SAM office is to make sure that we have supplied accurate and timely information to those in the network. If this is something that sounds interesting to you, please be on the lookout in the next few weeks for the invitation to get involved in SAM LN.

Of course advocacy does not stop or start with the legislative session. We are all responsible for staying in touch with educational issues that are happening at the local, state and national level. There are a couple of ways you can do that:



EmpowerED Superintendent edLeader Panel Series and Cybersecurity Resources



The most recent live broadcast in the EmpowerED Superintendent edLeader Panel Series, *Cybersecurity in Today's Learning Environments:* What School Leaders Must Know and Do aired on Monday, September 12, 2022. Superintendents Dr. Doug Brubaker, Texarkana ISD, TX, and Glenn Robbins, Brigantine Public Schools, NJ, joined Lorrie Owens, Chief Technology Officer, Integrated Technology Services, San Mateo County Office of Education, CA, and host/moderator Ann McMullan in sharing the leadership strategies they use to analyze a school district network's cybersecurity status as well as how to build and sustain school networks that are created to maximize security. 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
