

Hi SAM Legislative Network 2019 (SAMLN19) Members!

Highlights of Week 8 (Feb 25 - Mar 2)

The House met on Saturday, March 2 creating legislative Day 45 – the last day to transmit general bills for the 66th Legislative session. The schedule for Week 8 was changing continuously through Friday. Review <u>SAMLN19 Legislative Update 8 2-22-19</u> and <u>Podcast Week 8</u> to find out about the week's activity.

<u>Bills Followed by SAM Signed by Governor Bullock This Week</u>: <u>SB 11 (Salomon)</u> Clarify age requirements related to the definition of pupil to include 5-Year Olds, <u>HB 159 (Grubbs)</u> Generally revise education funding laws – both of these bills were supported by SAM. <u>HB 159 (Grubbs)</u> was signed by Governor Bullock on Wednesday, March 27 and provides .91% (FY 20) and 1.83% (FY 21) inflation added to the components of the school funding formula (no special ed component). On Thursday, March 28, OPI sent to school districts the <u>Preliminary FY2020 Budget Data Sheets</u> to assist our schools with beginning work on proposed budgets for the 2019-20 school year!

LC3270 is now <u>HB 638 (Bedey)</u> - Increasing K-12 special ed allowable cost payment – was assigned to the House Appropriations Committee. A hearing is yet to be scheduled but we will continue to follow this key special education bill. You will note that the bill provides one-time-only funding for the Special Ed Allowable Costs with inflation applied for FY 20 and FY 21 and then places this new amount as the base for beginning funding for the next biennium. The bill does not address the requested \$2 million to adjust the distribution formula and impacting Special Ed Coops positively for the future. We will continue to work to have HB 638 amended to include the Special Ed Coop adjustment.

On Friday, March 1, MT-PEC prepared an <u>Early Childhood Consensus Memo</u> in an attempt to revive discussions addressing the critical issue of early childhood education. This memo along with a bill draft (<u>Consensus Bill for Early Childhood Education</u>) has been shared with Governor Bullock and the following key legislators: Rep. Eric Moore, Rep. Casey Schreiner, Rep. Llew Jones. The bill, if adopted, would provide a public/private preschool option utilizing Head Start programming, and emphasizes enrollment of 4 year olds in a public preschool program under exceptional circumstances (funded through ANB) with assurances of quality for children throughout Montana. This Consensus Memo recommendation is aligned with SAM's <u>Resolution</u> #04/14/16-02 Pre-School Programs so we are advocating for this bill draft. Please review these documents and discuss this issue with your legislators.

Upcoming Week 9 (Mar 4 – Mar 9)

<u>SAM Followed Bills 3-1-19</u> are up to 116 with 257 bill drafts being monitored. <u>SAM Followed Bills Priority</u> <u>Status 3-1-19</u> describes the status of bills under the SAM advocacy priorities – Support Adequate and Equitable School Funding (21 bills), Support Recruitment and Retention of Quality Educators (5 bills), Oppose Privatization with Public Funds (0 bills), Support Facility and Technology Infrastructure (4 bills), Support School Based Mental Health Services (5 bills), and a new category of Other SAM Followed Bills (29 bills).

At the Transmittal Break, SAM has provided testimony 54 times in Committees on 39 different Bills. See the 2019 Legislative Session – SAM Testimony Log.
